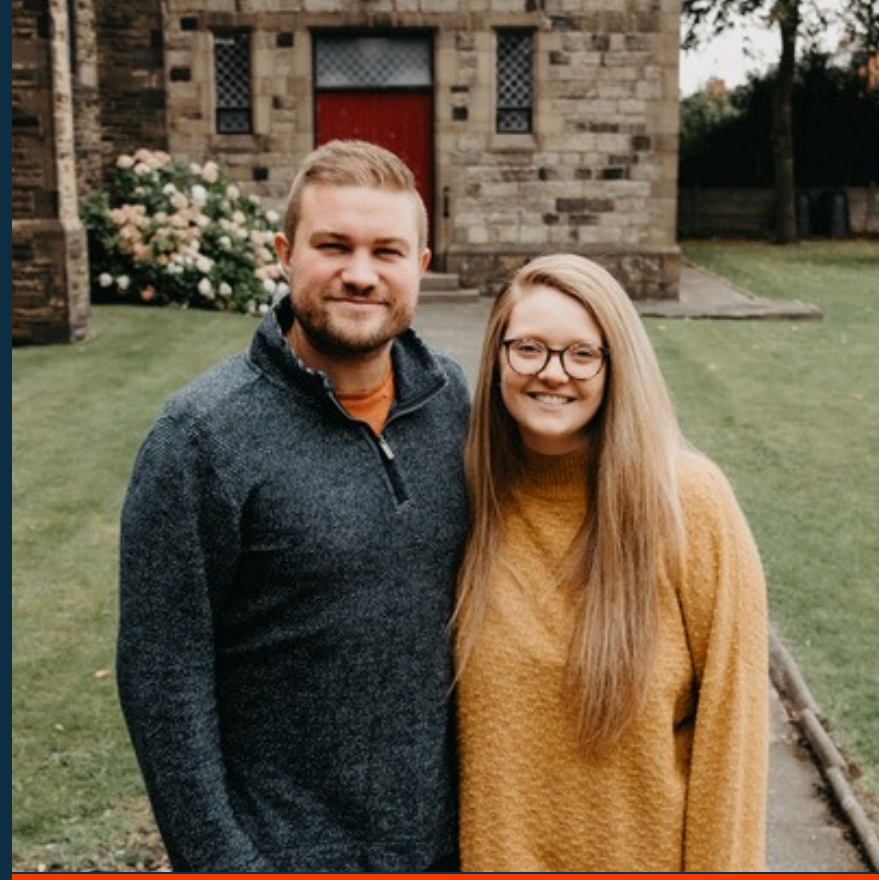

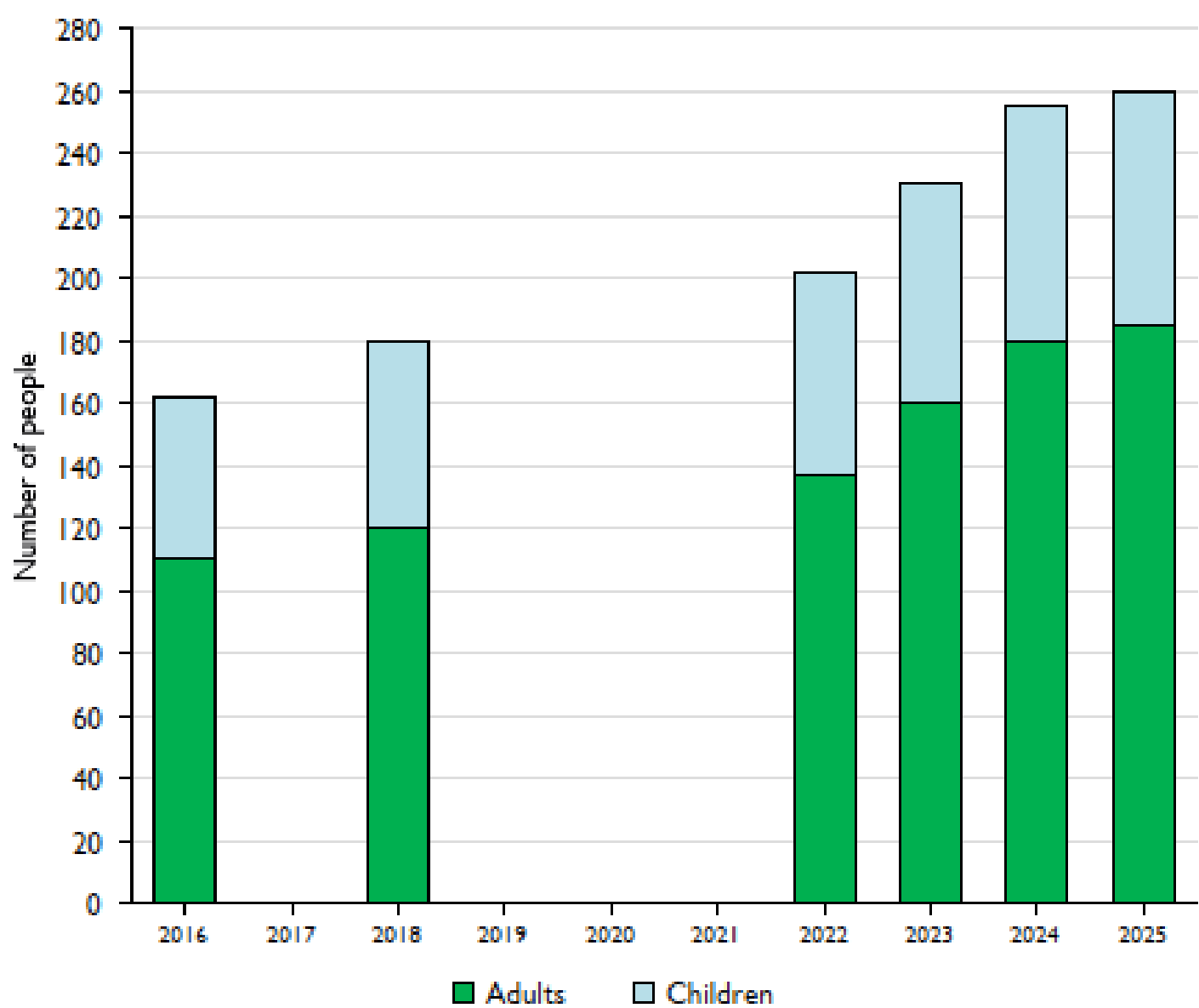

RECTOR'S REPORT

As we review this past year at St. Clement's there is much to give God thanks for.

During the past year God has increased the diversity of our congregation with new people joining church from an increasingly wide variety of backgrounds. Our increasingly diverse church reflects our increasingly diverse community in East Manchester. Being an increasingly diverse church is a wonderful blessing (and a small picture of the worldwide kingdom of Jesus Christ) but it is also a challenge as we work out how to do life with those who are very different to ourselves. Keeping Jesus Christ and his gospel at the centre of church life is crucial as what unites us is our faith in him not our culture or background. We are about spreading a passion for Jesus Christ in Manchester, the UK and the world.

Another reason for thanksgiving is the increased interest in the gospel that we have seen in our area. A number of people who are not from religious backgrounds have found their way to St Clement's over the past year. Some have been reading the Bible or listening to podcasts and sermons online. Coming to church has been the next step for them in their faith journey. Our prayer is that God would continue the salvation work that he has begun in their lives and that God would bring more people this coming year to a living faith in Jesus Christ.

A third reason for thanksgiving that I wanted to mention is the way I see members of our church serving one another in love. Giving time, money and using their gifts for the blessing of others. I thank God for enabling you to serve each other in this way. Would you join me in using the words of the apostle Paul to pray that we would continue to love each other like this in the coming year.

CHURCH WARDEN'S REPORT

We continue to praise God for his goodness to us in bringing so many new people to join us in worship each week, often with so many diverse backgrounds, which enriches our fellowship and reflects our parish population. St Clements has not just grown numerically at morning services but also in our discipleship as more and more of us are members of community groups sharing life weekly in the building or in each other's homes and in Community Group Central meetings. The weekly evening service is growing numerically and many people find it a great way to start a new week praising God and learning from His word. Having so many worshipping here on Sunday mornings does sometimes stretch the church's capacity and the PCC has commissioned an architectural feasibility study to explore possible structural building options within a range of other solutions which are being carefully considered.

As part of St Clement's Aims and Objectives contained in its vision to spread a passion for Jesus Christ in Manchester, the church does strive to serve as many different demographic groups of people as possible. During 2025 the church engaged in ministries with the over 60's group, toddlers, juniors, young people, students, second language English speakers, school parents and food bank clients. It is so encouraging to know that the church is being used every day of the week in term time, other than Fridays, to serve others both within our church and more widely in the Higher Openshaw community, to pray, worship and reach out with the gospel.

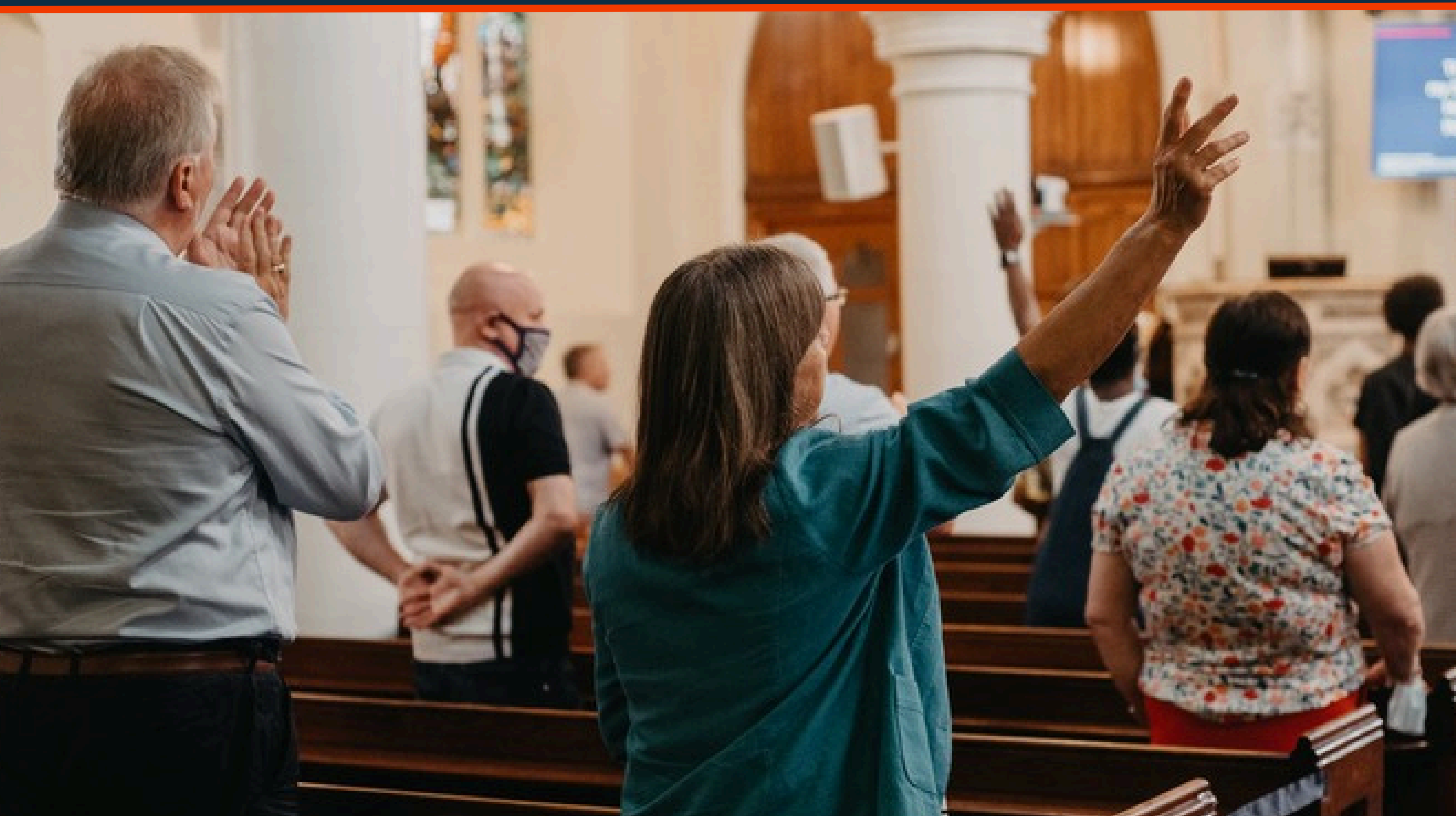
At Christmas it was wonderful to have so many different Christmas services as well as so many school Christmas events take place in the building. As well as established carol services (Traditional, Childrens and Contemporary) our church building hosted another International Carol Service. For the second year, our diverse church communities led us in celebrating the birth of our Lord. The Watchnight service continues to be an important event especially for African members of our congregation.

For the first time our church Cantonese fellowship organised a mid-autumn festival which was enjoyed by church members and the local Cantonese community. A St Clement's Reunion took place in May, an occasion that brought together and blessed people who had their formative Christian lives here and who in most cases had moved away from the parish.

Regarding the physical church buildings, it was possible to maintain the church well again this year and thanks are due to the gardening, maintenance and cleaning teams. The church heating system broke down in September and major repairs were required.

We are saddened by the devastating times of bereavement for many people and families in the congregation. We praise God for everlasting life through Jesus Christ our Lord and we pray for peace, sustenance and blessed assurance for all those in continuing grief.

The wide variety of church ministries wouldn't be possible without the dedicated service of so many members of the congregation regularly giving up time after work, weekends, and days off all often within busy and precious family lives. We thank Rev Paul, Rev Henry, Alex, Bishop Keith and their families for their total commitment and dedicated preaching and leading among us week by week led and inspired by prayer and reliance on God's word. We also thank Nicci Woolley and Erin Skelton, for all their important hard work often behind the scenes.

REVIEW OF 2025:

SAFEGUARDING REPORT

Our work among children, young people and vulnerable adults has continued to grow dramatically throughout the past year and our child protection procedures have continued to be undertaken conscientiously by all concerned in these very important ministries. We as a church want to serve our church family and community well but it is essential that we do this safely and with clarity.

As this work continues to grow, so does the need for safeguarding input and guidance in the background of activities to ensure the safety and foresight of all involved.

We, as a church, liaise with the diocese and for advice where clarification is required and we take very seriously everything that is brought to our attention. They support us with all decisions made regarding safeguarding within our church. As a church we must all work together. It is the whole congregation's responsibility to be vigilant in all our behaviour and attitudes to put children, young people, and vulnerable adults first at all times to enable us to serve safely and serve well.

Trying to ensure everyone has done the training required including the required updates and completed their paperwork and checks prior to volunteering is no small task in a rapidly growing church but is an important element of safeguarding our volunteers and those we care for in our ministry. We have been immensely grateful for Erin stepping in to assist with the admin side of this during this year.

As the church grows and our buildings are used extensively, which is fantastic and a great witness, it also increases our awareness of potential issues. Posters are placed around church with whom to contact, leaders of the groups are available, and details are on the church website. No concern is too small to bring to our attention and will be dealt with in the appropriate manner. We rely on timely, accurate information being passed on to us as a safeguarding team by anyone who has a concern. This can be done by email, phone or in person. **Good communication regarding safeguarding is essential** to ensure we maintain the safety of all people involved or attending church and the ministry outreach. It is always better to raise a concern than to ignore it and we urge anyone to email the safeguarding team with any issues, concerns or questions rather than approaching the leadership team where possible as the safeguarding team are specifically tasked with this role to enable the leadership team to lead the wider church pastorally.

We would like to thank all involved in working in these ministries for being so cooperative in doing all the paperwork and completing the online training, especially when volunteering so much of their free time to ministry already. As the church congregation increases so does the safeguarding workload, for this reason the safeguarding team has grown, and I would ask people to prayerfully consider volunteering if you feel God calling you to do so and speak to the safeguarding officer about this.

CARE TEAM

It is a blessing to say that much of the care within St Clement's happens organically as our church family fervently look out for one another. The care team exists to support the regular pastoral care of the church family by providing coordinated responses to moments of particular pastoral need. As our church family continues to grow in number, we are committed to ensuring no-one falls through the cracks. The care team consists of 8 care coordinators who oversee pastoral visitations, the provision of church family meals, the administration of the hardship fund, prayer ministry, soul care, and safeguarding. Thank you to Steve Helme who faithfully oversees this, and who has wholeheartedly committed to the financial wellbeing of our church family and community through the development of money coaching.

CHILDREN & YOUTH

Gospel Kids

Gospel Kids is our Sunday school ministry for 4-11 year olds. We have looked through the Gospel of Mark, Jonah, a selection of Psalms, and 'God's Big Picture' Bible overview. It has been a pleasure to regularly connect with the kids of church families and welcome some new people over the year.

The Hub

The Hub is our Tuesday afterschool club for 4-11 year olds, with a particular focus on providing a welcoming 'easy invite' to non-Christian friends. We have seen some growth this year driven by children evangelising to their friends which is a major encouragement. We continue to look through a Story Book Bible each week.

Roots

Tuesday night Roots is our youth ministry to 11-18 year olds and continues to be one of the busiest ministries I oversee. We have looked through Jonah, Ephesians and a series looking at big Bible Questions.

Roots Sunday Chill is a youth Bible study at my house for the older teenagers in school year 11-13. We have been following the Community Group series, as well as looking at 'Living Out' Kaleidoscope material exploring how Christians can faithfully engage with members of the LGBTQ+ community.

Within our youth ministry we also offer 1:1 same gender discipleship for the older teenagers which continues to be one of my highlights each year.

Holiday Bible Club

HBC 2025 was a great event and personally I feel we as a church really have gotten into the swing of running it. Around 100 kids made up of church family, other local churches and members of our community filled St Clement's for four mornings of Pirate themed fun, looking through the book of Jonah. "Salvation comes from the Lord!"

'Did you know that 75% of British under 5s attend a church-run toddler group?''* We are so thankful for the great outreach opportunity Clementunes is! Parents/carers and their little ones are welcomed through our church doors on a Monday morning where they enjoy a noisy, musical session upstairs, or a calmer, gentler session downstairs, followed by time spent chatting together over hot cuppas and homemade treats.

As part of our session we sing songs about God and read Bible stories; please pray that these would stir the hearts of the little ones and their adults, and that these families would be drawn into church life and come to know Jesus as their King.

We've enjoyed some seasonal events this year, such as our end of year Summer picnic (with hot dogs and a bouncy castle!), the Light Party in October and our most recent Easter party, with 28 children and their families in attendance and hearing the Easter story!

Thank you to the amazing team members, volunteers, kitchen support and bakers as they faithfully serve and facilitate this ministry each week. And thank you to God for His faithfulness and provision to us in sustaining Clementunes for another year.

Clementeenies (crèche) | Rhea Tatchell

Crèche is the childcare provision on Sundays for our smallest church members (0-5 year olds). We have around 10-15 children joining us weekly for play, a bible story, a breadstick snack, singing and a colouring activity sheet to take home. It is a joy to see the children interacting with each other and joining in with story time with enthusiasm. Singing and action songs continue to be a favourite activity for lots of our little ones and is a joyful (and noisy!) part of our weekly session. We also love the bubble machine!

Once again a big thank you to our fantastic team of volunteers who servant-heartedly help out approximately 1 in 4 Sundays. We're always in need of more volunteers so do chat to Rhea if you're interested in serving in this ministry.

FOOD BANK & COMMUNITY CAFÉ

Food Bank (Keith Worsfold)

We started our food bank in March 2020 at the beginning of Covid lockdown with about 7 parcels on a pew in church and it has continued to grow and expand. We're open every Tuesday afternoon and provide food & toiletries for people and we have a representative from Citizens Advice to help people with other problems.

The Trussell Trust, who we partner with, provide the majority of food and organise all the referrals, administration etc.

On average we helped feed 318 adults and 144 children on a monthly basis last year. We also received a grant that enabled us to buy Christmas toys which meant every child received a present for Christmas. Please email the church office if you would like to set up a monthly standing order to support the food bank. Many thanks to our fantastic team of volunteers. We praise God for His many blessings and provision.

Community Café (Gill Jump)

We have had a great year in the community cafe on a Tuesday afternoon. One of the highlights has been a closer working relationship with the Trussell Trust and some joint training looking at how we maintain a professional and yet explicitly Christian focus in our interactions.

We have continued blessing the community with the simple pleasures of a toastie and a piece of homemade cake. Big thanks again to Tash for all her hard work baking. We are also grateful to new team members, Zainab, Esther, Judith and Stacey.

We are always happy to have new team members join us as we now open for longer hours, 1.15 till 4.30. Please get in touch if you have any availability on a Tuesday afternoon.

We meet weekly on a Monday evening to sing together, have fun, build friendships, and work towards events that we sing at across the year. 2025 saw the joyful introduction of the 'Rounds with Caroline' section of choir rehearsals on a Monday, bringing the choir team to include Jo Rogers, Caroline Haddock, Eleonore Kimberley, and Andrew Allwright.

Through the year, the main events that choir sang at were church services and church related events. In 2025 this included Palm Sunday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday Services, Pentecost Sunday, Holiday at Home, Remembrance Sunday, and the traditional Christmas Carol service.

Monday evenings continue to include a mix of sacred and secular repertoire, allowing for the chance to belt out some 'Wicked' tunes alongside time for genuine worship together. With the attendance of primarily St Clement's members fluctuating from 12 - 25 people week to week across the year, we aim to cater for both our experienced musicians and new singers by working on good technique and building skills in a fun and interactive way. Monday Football

God has really been faithful to all of us; the praise here is to his faithful hand in the workings of the men's football group. Every Monday we meet up at the local football pitch in Openshaw (Ten Acres Sports Complex) from 9 pm-10 pm. What started as a small group of St Clement brothers has expanded to also welcome young men from outside a church community last year. Therefore, the mission for 2025 was really about building a culture within the group; a culture where people are able to play a competitive game of football but build relationships with strangers. Most importantly, a culture that cultivates the knowledge that God is present and amongst us, including when we are playing football! To walk towards this mission, we established a habit of gathering before 'kick-off' for ice-breakers, but also to pray: giving God the glory for bringing us together and asking Him to dwell among us as we competed. We are so humbled to say that God really moved in this initiative, because we saw the guys really take to gathering round and praying together before playing. There was also a positive transition in the exchange between individuals, allowing players of all levels to express themselves. We also managed to arrange a few socials with the guys outside of the pitch side to further cultivate relationships. But this is only the beginning. God is moving rapidly, and I cannot wait to see how he leads us in this ministry in 2026



REVIEW OF 2025:

INTERNATIONAL MINISTRY + COFFEE & CONVERSATION

2025 has been a joyful year of welcoming people from all nations into the St Clement's church family, celebrating unity in worship and growth in our knowledge of God.

Sunday services continue to be multinational gatherings, and in 2025, we turned to the 'Breeze' system for live digital translation of the service into many languages. Our deepest gratitude goes to the tech team for making that possible. We hope this will allow all those who speak English as a second language to feel included in services and to understand not only the sermon but also all aspects of the service, including community life announcements.

At the close of 2025, a Cantonese-language Bible study is regularly meeting, and a Cantonese Christianity Explored course took place earlier in the year. A Farsi Bible study was formed in early 2025 and is going strong, working through the 'Come Follow Me' material.

The Saturday-morning "Coffee and Conversation" ministry is in its fourth year and has hosted guests from at least 30 different countries, helping them practise their English and giving them the opportunity to read a Bible story. This year, termly social activities, such as wreath making at Christmas and shared meals featuring foods from our own cultures, increased guest participation and fostered greater community. Several guests attended Easter and Christmas services, and some now attend church regularly. The ministry continues to be blessed by faithful volunteers from the St Clement's congregation coming to either chat with the guests or help with the crèche.

Two new events took place in 2025: a mid-autumn festival gathering organised by members of the congregation from Hong Kong and a Nowruz (Persian New Year) celebration. Both were a rich blessing to the church family.

The second International Christmas carol service was a fantastic event once again, featuring songs from African, Cantonese, and French choirs, a German solo, and a reading in Farsi. There are plans in 2026 to hold a further Nowruz celebration, put on another international carols and consider other ways we can celebrate each other's cultures together.



REVIEW OF 2025:

MISSION PARTNERS

David and Mary are in their eleventh year serving in South Asia in a muslim-majority region. David is ordained as an Anglican minister and they lead a bilingual church alongside the bishop in their city, with particular responsibility for the youth and children's ministry. David and Mary have also been heading up a new drug rehab centre. Do pray for this endeavour as it continues to serve vulnerable people.

Paul & Helen served their final year in West Africa in 2025. Helen continued to serve in the emergency department of the state hospital with stretched and limited resources. Paul served as national director for a large missions agency, supporting missionaries, local church leaders and a seminary. Unfortunately the family had to leave the field suddenly in October after the security situation deteriorated. The girls' school sadly had to close and at the end of 2025 the family began to settle back in Manchester indefinitely.

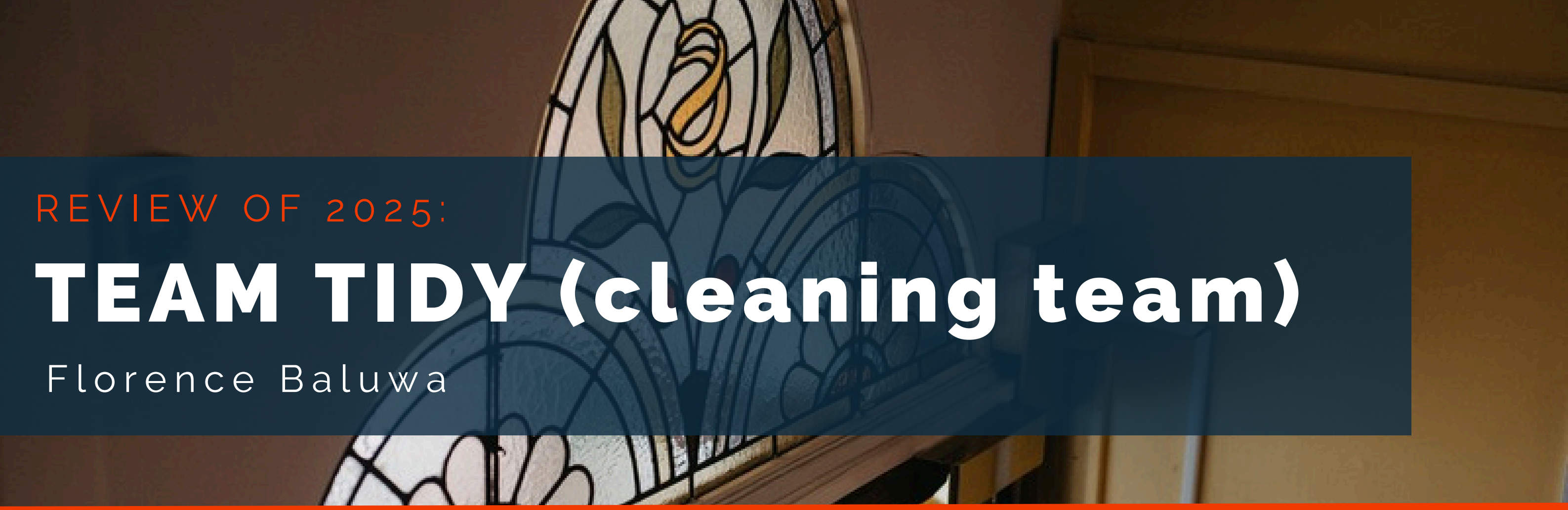
Throughout 2025 **Judith** served in the leadership of the school attended by Paul & Helen's girls. Judith faced persistent short-staffing and falling pupil numbers and bore the burden of closing down the school when the security situation deteriorated and many of the missionaries and their families left the field. Judith continued to support some of the pupils remotely and began exploring new opportunities in educating the children of missionaries in the field. Do pray for her as she discerns and plans her next steps.

James & Juliette continue their work in South East Asia. James practices medicine in a clinic with fellow believers. Their 3 children are in local education. The family spent several weeks in the UK during the summer of 2025 catching up with family, friends and supporters. James & Juliette have a particular calling to share the gospel with a certain people group in a neighbouring province to which access is not always straightforward. Through faithful prayer, James and Juliette are starting to see doors opening up to this province and opportunities arising, developing relationships with a small but growing family of believers. Please pray they are able to deepen these relationships and see more fruit among that people group.

Dan & Vicky continue to bring the gospel to Muslims in North Africa. Dan is teaching at a school established by Christians. They practice cold-contact evangelism and have a prayer ministry for persecuted and incarcerated believers in the region. Join them in prayer as they continued to seek discernment and wisdom for the direction of their ministry, praying lots with their team mates.

Barney completed 3 years with UCCF as a part-time staff worker in creative evangelism in the summer of 2025. He served the Christian Unions in the universities in Manchester and Salford, with a particular emphasis encouraging the students at the Royal Northern College of Music in their evangelism and discipleship. Barney has therefore finished as an associate missions partner at St Clements.

TEAM TIDY (cleaning team)

Over the past year, our church cleaning ministry (Team Tidy) has served quietly but faithfully, preparing God's house with care, reverence, and consistency. Much of this work happens behind the scenes, yet it is a meaningful act of worship and stewardship—honouring the Lord and loving His people by caring for the spaces where the church family gathers.

A central theme of the year has been gratitude for God's provision, especially the health and strength He has given to those who serve. Even when weeks were demanding, the Lord enabled our team members to keep coming into church to clean, and we thank Him for His sustaining grace and protection. This year also carried deep sorrow with the death of our dear Sister Elizabeth Thompson who was a long-time member of our team. We honour her memory and trust God to comfort those who mourn, keeping us anchored in the hope of Jesus Christ.

God also encouraged us by adding new members to the cleaning team. Their willingness to serve has strengthened our team, and it has been a joy to welcome and guide them. At the same time, we still need more hands to keep the work sustainable when illness, travel, or family responsibilities reduce availability. We prayerfully invite others to join—weekly, fortnightly, or monthly—because every willing heart makes a difference. I have completed my examination. I confirm that no material matters have come to my attention in connection with the examination which gives me cause to believe that in, any material respect:

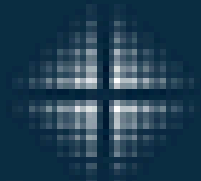
